MEADOWS PARK

In 2021, the City of New Port Richey contracted with Wannamacher Jensen Architects to re-design the current Meadows Dog Park, located on Larch Lane and Meadowbrook Lane. The project will bring many updates and new features to the park, including dog play areas and added amenities for families and people of all ages. To highlight the additional amenities, the park's name will be updated to Meadows Park.

The dog play areas will be divided into two sections, one for small dogs and one for large dogs. It will include new fencing, sod, hoops, tubes, steppers, and hurdles for canines to run through and jump on.

The updated park design will feature an improved parking area, picnic tables, shade structures, lighted pathways, updated restrooms, and water fountains. A new walkway from the parking



area will lead to a crushed gravel pathway trail surrounding the park. Three new play areas with swings and play structures that accommodate all ages and abilities will replace the aging play structure. A bouldering section is planned for older children, and a Ninja climbing apparatus for teens and adults promises to help adventurers develop their climbing skills. Due to the popularity of pickleball and the increasing demand for courts, the existing hardcourt will be developed into three Pickleball courts.

The project is in the final design phase with construction underway later this fall.








▶ The Downtown Area Roundabout Trolley (DART) is the green way to get around downtown. Starting at and returning to the new Parking Structure located at Main Street and U.S. Highway 19, the DART provides residents and visitors a convenient ride to popular destinations around the downtown area. When downtown parking is full, you can park at the Parking Structure and be safely transported to different stops to explore unique shops, dining establishments, and entertainment! There is no fee to park in the Parking Structure, and the DART is a courtesy service of the City of New Port Richey.

The two ADA-accessible DARTs are electric vehicles with solar panel backup power. Mayor Rob Marlowe had this to say about the inaugural voyage: "As a big advocate of ecofriendly EV transportation, I love to see the City continue using more EVs to help protect the environment as well as New Port Richey. In addition, the DART will transport people to different parts of our historic downtown."

The DART operates on Thursdays and Fridays from 5 pm until midnight, Saturdays from noon to midnight, and Sundays from noon to 6 pm. Hours will vary with holidays and special events. The Parking Structure is open daily from 7:30 am until midnight, with extended hours during special events. Any DART or parking updates will be available on the official City Downtown NPR website at downtownpr.org or Facebook page or Instagram account, both found at @downtownpr.

The New Port Richey Fire Department's proud tradition of providing emergency services started 100 years ago, making the Department the oldest in Pasco County. Established in 1922 as a volunteer fire department, the New Port Richey Fire Department has continued to evolve and provide the highest level of emergency services through fire suppression, advanced life support medical care, rescue operations, fire prevention, and public education. The Department is composed of 22 full-time Firefighters/Paramedics, and operates out of two strategically located fire stations. Last year, the Department responded to a record number of nearly 6,000 emergency calls with an average emergency response time of four minutes.

Future plans have been completed to construct a new fire station #2 located at 5220 Grand Boulevard, replacing the current station on High Street. The new facility will help meet the increasing calls for emergency services throughout the City and allow for quicker response times to the busy U.S. Highway 19 corridor. In addition, activities celebrating the centennial will occur in September.

Spring Neighborhood CLEAN-UP DAY

Neighborhood Clean-up Day on Saturday, May 21, from 8 am to 5 pm. City residents are encouraged to properly dispose of unwanted items and help keep our City beautiful. Dumpsters will be placed at Frances Avenue Park, 5580 Frances Avenue, and at the former River Road Church property at 6131 South River Road. The River Road site will also accept up to four boxes of paper per household for the on-site paper shredder in addition to undamaged TVs and computer monitors. A current Florida Driver's license or City utility bill proving residence within the City of New Port Richey is required to participate.

TREE CITY USA



▶ The Grand Boulevard Multi-Use Path will connect the existing Multi-Use Paths at Marine Parkway and Madison Street. Once complete, the Grand Boulevard Multi-Use Path will join the City to the Pinellas and Starkey Trails. The Grand Boulevard Multi-Use Path Project is currently in design, for the first phase of the project which will span from Marine Parkway to Gulf Drive. Amenities will include a 10ft. wide path, landscaping, stormwater drainage improvements, seating areas, and decorative lighting.



SUMMER LIBRARY CHALLENGE



What Are Add Walorem Taxes

Ad Valorem, more commonly known as property taxes, are annual taxes assessed on a percentage property's real estate value. Local governments use the revenue to pay for local services, such as public safety, culture and recreation, and other government services. Ad Valorem is Latin for "according to value" and is thought to be a fair basis for collecting taxes because you pay your proportional share based upon the value of your property.

How Is It Calculated?

Ad Valorem taxes are calculated by dividing the taxable value of a property by 1,000 and multiplying this by the millage rate. For example, consider a property with a taxable value equaling \$110,000 and a homestead exemption of \$10,000. If the annual millage rate is 8.5000, the amount of property tax due for that property on a yearly basis equals \$850.

Park! Improvements are planned for this quaint 6.63-acre neighborhood park located along the Pithlachascotee River off of Louisiana Avenue. The park provides residents and visitors a variety of amenities including an ADA accessible playground, covered picnic shelters, restroom facilities, a basketball court, open field space, and a kayak launch to the Cotee River.

The City hired Ayres and Associates to design the project, which was made possible through funding in the City's Capital Improvement Plan and a matching grant from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Land and Water Conservation Fund. Once the improvements are complete, families and visitors of all ages can enjoy a picnic in one of the newly renovated shelters or walk on the new benchlined walkways, while kayak and canoe enthusiasts can continue to enjoy the updated kayak launch area.

EV Charging Stations/City Vehicles



▶ The City is driving forward with environmentally friendly enhancements by adding four electric and two hybrid vehicles to the fleet. By September 2022, The City will add an additional electric and eight hybrid vehicles.

Residents and visitors can use one of the six electric vehicle charging stations conveniently located throughout the city. The charging stations are located at the Parking Structure, Gloria Swanson Parking Lot, Sims Park Parking Lot, Thomas Meighan Parking Lot, City Hall Auxiliary Parking Lot, and the Recreation & Aquatic Center. Each station is equipped with two charging ports. There is no fee to utilize these charging stations at this time. In addition, the Thomas Meighan Parking lot on Nebraska Avenue will remain free of charge thanks to a Duke Energy grant. Please note that the EV parking spaces are only to be utilized while your EV is plugged in and being charged.

Save Water and Money with Conservation Program

As the population in the Tampa Bay region continues to grow, so dos the need for water. City residents and businesses can make a lasting impact now and in our future. Together, we can save water and delay the need to build new water supplies.

Tampa Bay Water Wise is a regional water conservation program offered by Tampa Bay Water, its member governments, and the Southwest Florida Water Management District. The program helps homeowners and business owners

save water and money by providing 11 different rebates ranging from \$75-\$40,000 for using water-efficient equipment.

Some of the ways to earn rebates:

RESIDENTIAL:

- **♦** Up to \$100 for High Efficiency Toilet Retrofit
- ♦ Up to \$1,000 for Shallow Wells for Outdoor Irrigation

BUSINESS (NON-RESIDENTIAL):

- **♦** Up to \$1,000 for Cooling Towers
- ♦ Up to \$400 for Energy Star certified dishwashers.

This rebate program aims to save up to 11 million gallons of drinking water per day by 2030, at a quarter of the cost of the least expensive new water supply source. When everyone does their part, the savings really add up!
