City of New Port Richey to FIMPLEMENT SINGLE-HAULER WASTE REMOVAL AGREEMENT

After several years of research surrounding solid waste collection systems—considering factors like service quality, economics, and overall community impact—the City of New Port Richey has concluded that partnering with a single waste collection service provider for all solid waste, yard debris, and recycling services within city limits will prove the most universally favorable option for residents and businesses.

Upon implementation of this change in early 2024, we anticipate many positive impacts on our community, including:

- Reduced Road Damage: Consolidating waste collection with a single company following a specific route decreases the transit of vehicles, preserving road safety and maintenance by minimizing wear and tear.
- Improved Air Quality: Fewer diesel trucks mean reduced exhaust fumes, lowering our carbon footprint and improving the quality of the air we breathe.
- Fewer Noise Disturbances: Shifting to a consolidated waste hauler schedule minimizes disruptions for residents and businesses, particularly for those who are retired or caring for young children at home.

Out of many options, the City elected to contract with Waste Pro of Florida d.b.a. J.D. Parker and Sons, a business with local roots and over 75 years of service in our city. Its origins trace back to 1949 when John Henry Parker started hauling trash for his neighbors in the back of his pickup truck for a quarter a can.



We're the oldest waste hauler in Pasco, and we've been here in New Port Richey since the beginning," says Dave Parker, Division Manager of J.D. Parker & Sons. "We're extremely connected to this city, so this partnership holds a lot of meaning for us.

According to City Manager Debbie L. Manns, "J.D. Parker and Sons is a standout business in our community—not only for their long-standing history of service to our city, but also for their exceptional customer service and strong business ethics."

The company's commitment to top-notch service is evident in its recent investments in state-of-the-art equipment to support this partnership. It is also backed by a pledge to remain an accessible local business.

I think we're a great fit for the city because we have access to big resources, but we're still a local business with an open-door policy," Parker adds. "If you have a question or an issue, call us or come into the office...we'll always be there to help.

The partnership is scheduled to go into effect on March 2, 2024. No service registration or cancellation of existing services is needed to facilitate this change.




Emerald Coast Brewing Co. This new craft brewery on Main Street is serving up its own creations alongside a variety of local favorites.

Band Together to Help Neighbors in Need

Our Code Enforcement officers ensure community safety and quality of life by upholding regulations. However, individuals facing physical or financial limitations may find tasks essential for code compliance—like tree trimming, junk removal, and debris clearance—particularly challenging.

Such was the case for one New Port Richey resident, whose circumstances changed dramatically after her husband passed away. Though the state of her residence harbored multiple code enforcement violations, officers opted for empathy as their guiding course of action.

"Given her scenario, we all wanted to help rather than adding to her stress with fines," says Code Enforcement Manager Erik Jay. "For those who are having a hard time and can't do these things for themselves, lending a hand is the right thing to do."

In support of a neighbor in need, the New Port Richey Police Department and City officials including the chief of police and the city manager worked together to bring the building up to code, including clearing 40 yards of debris, cleaning gutters, trimming trees, eliminating overgrowth, pressure washing, and painting the home. They also went on to identify and support a second home in need, collectively dedicating over 100 volunteer hours to these community enhancement projects.

"I think this is indicative of what we're all working toward here," says City Manager Debbie L. Manns. "We all want to help because we are committed to ensuring our community is well taken care of."



"Afterward, to hear people say that this has 'changed their life'... that's so impactful," remarks Jay. "It feels great that with a couple of days' worth of effort, we've made a meaningful difference for these members of our community."


The library is also now lending blood pressure kits and will offer educational classes on cardiac health and more. Stay tuned for more health initiatives in 2024!

WATER RESTRICTION UPDATES

weight, BMI, pulse, and blood pressure.

This year, New Port Richey has experienced a significant reduction in annual precipitation. As a result, the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) implemented a Water Shortage Order which imposes water usage restrictions across 15 counties.

For Pasco, a Modified Phase I Order has gone into effect as of December 1st. These restrictions aim to curb "wasteful and unnecessary" water consumption, specifically limiting outdoor irrigation to once per week.

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FIRE ALARM INITIATIVE

To add to the many lifesaving services the New Port Richey Fire Department provides, the department has partnered with the American Red Cross to supply and install smoke alarms throughout the community. Through the "Sound the Alarm-Save a Life" Home Fire Campaign, the Fire Department conducted two events this year, installing 234 alarms with 10-year batteries in 129 homes. These measures significantly boost community risk reduction initiatives, emphasizing the crucial role of functional alarms in early fire detection. Looking forward, the department plans to host more smoke alarm events and extend installation services for city residents upon request.

DID YOU KNOW THAT:

- You have just two minutes to escape a home fire
- Seven people die every day on average from home fires in the United States
- Three out of five fire deaths happen in homes with either no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms
- More than 30 people suffer injuries every day on average from home fires in the United States
- The risk of dying in a home fire is cut in half in homes with working smoke alarms

AUTOPAY: Bills are paid automatically each month via electronic withdrawal from your bank account, free of charge.

PAY BY TEXT: Automatic payment reminders are sent by text message to your cell phone, and bills can be paid by simply clicking the link sent in the text.

ONLINE: Pay your bill online 24/7 via credit or debit card.

IN-PERSON: Make your payment at City Hall via cash, check, money order or credit card.

PAY BY MAIL: Mail your check or money order directly to the Water Department at 5919 Main Street, New Port Richey, FL 34652.

AMSCOT: Pay in-person at your local Amscot branch.
